

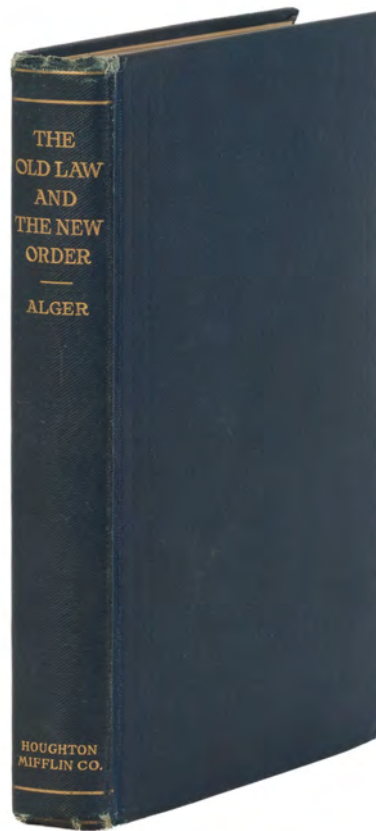

* A collection of essays by American progressive thinker and social critic George William Alger that examines the American legal system at the turn of the 20th century. Alger explores the tension between traditional, rigid legal frameworks ("the old law") and a rapidly evolving, industrialized society ("the new order"). He argues that while old laws successfully maintained order in the past, they were becoming insufficient for modern economic and social realities.

The text explores criticisms of the failures and slow-moving nature of the criminal justice system and courts along with an analysis of the relationship between executive power, evolving social norms, labor and industry regulation. Alger's essays directly challenge the rigid "formalism" of 19th-century courts, which frequently struck down labor and safety laws under the guise of "freedom of contract." This book serves as an essential primary document illustrating how early 20th-century lawyers fought to adapt constitutional law to the realities of industrialization, labor exploitation and growing corporate monopoly power.

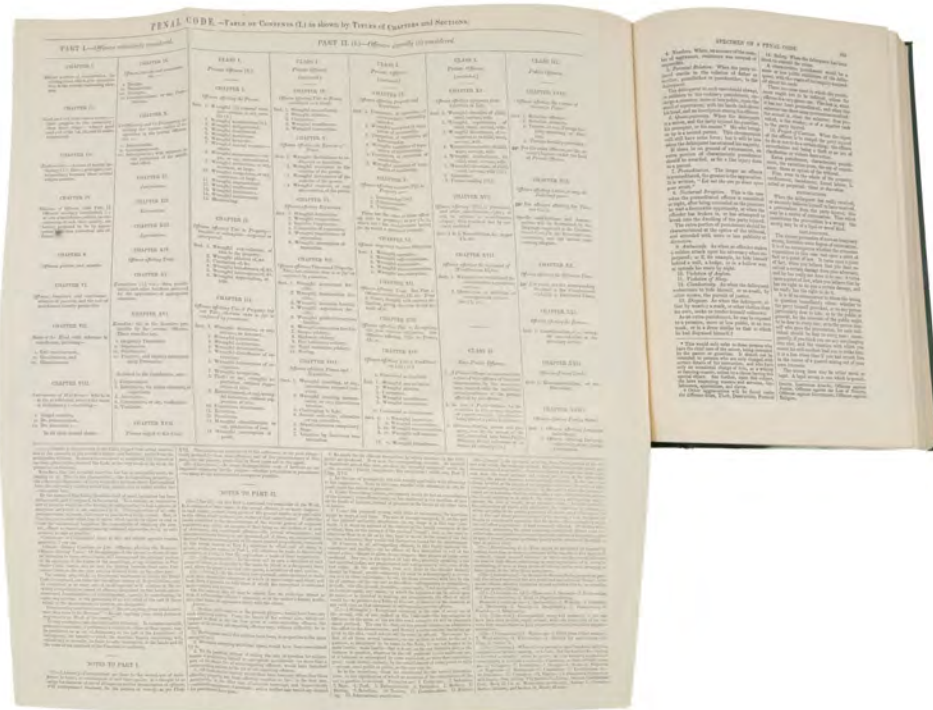
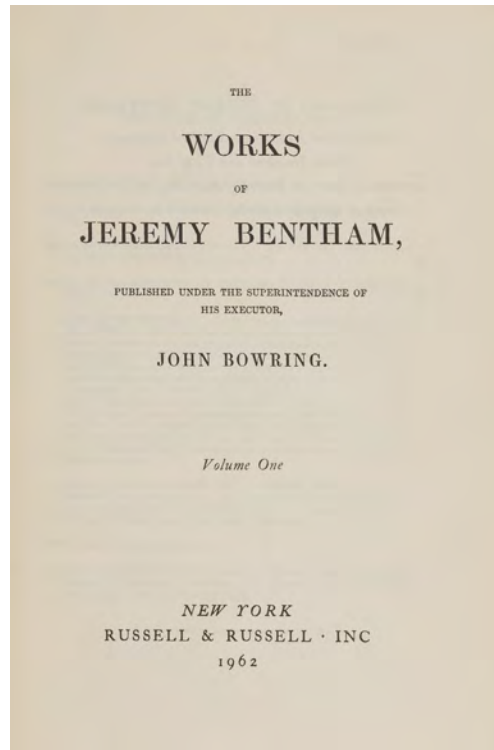

* One of a limited edition of 350 sets published by Russell & Russell, faithfully reproducing the first collected edition of Bentham's works prepared by his literary executor, Sir John Bowring, between 1838 and 1843. Jeremy Bentham (1748-1832) remains one of the most influential figures in modern jurisprudence and political philosophy, fundamentally reshaping Western legal thought by substituting empirical reason and the principle of utility for natural law and tradition. As David M. Walker observes in *The Oxford Companion to Law*, his "works have had great practical influence in subsequent legislation, and gave great impulse to such projects as codification, consolidation of statutes, and the abolition of antiquated and arbitrary rules."

This set comprises virtually all of Bentham's major treatises, including his seminal writings on utilitarian morals and legislation, penal reform, judicial procedure, and evidence, supplemented by John Hill Burton's comprehensive "Introduction to the Study of Bentham" and Burton's invaluable analytical index volume. Due to the scarcity and fragility of the 1838-1843 Edinburgh printing, this sturdy 1962 reissue served as the primary working reference for legal historians and philosophers during the post-war revival of Bentham studies.

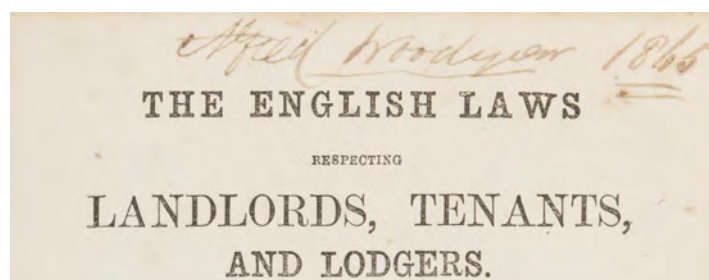

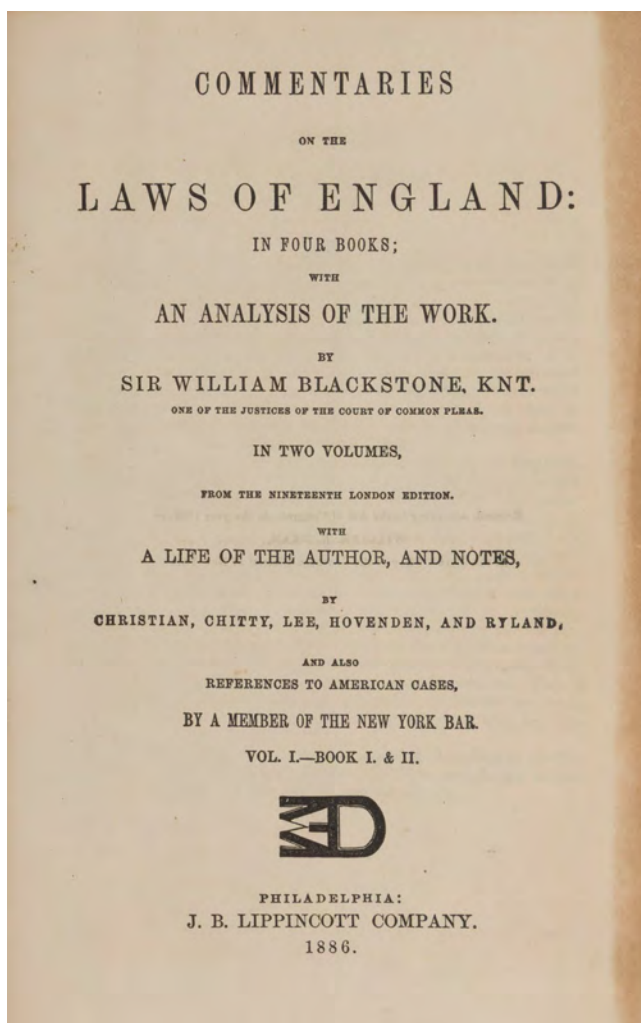
* An unrecorded edition of this highly popular mid-Victorian legal vade mecum, designed to navigate the rapid urbanization and complex rental landscapes of mid-nineteenth-century Britain. While Bishop's practical handbook eventually ran to over forty editions under various titles, all printings remain exceedingly scarce in commerce-most having been heavily handled, referenced, and ultimately read to pieces by contemporary property owners and renters.

The provisional provenance of this copy is particularly compelling; the property stamp indicates it was utilized by a draper in West Cowes (Isle of Wight), a bustling maritime town and fashionable Victorian resort area where the management of shop leases and seasonal boarding houses made such legal summaries indispensable to local tradesmen.

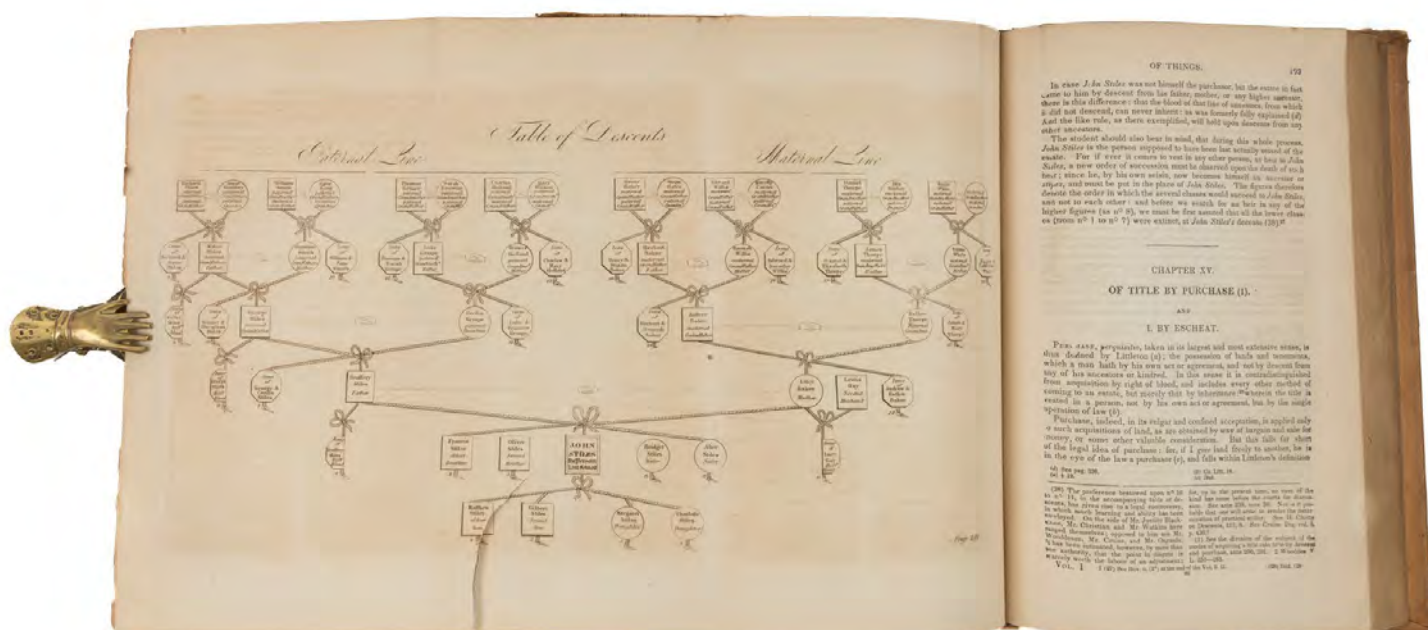
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* Chitty's celebrated edition of the Commentaries first appeared in London in 1826 and became a staple of Anglo-American legal education. Because Chitty prepared no subsequent revisions, later publishers continuously reprinted his framework, adding annotations from scholars like Christian, Lee, Hovenden, and Ryland. This 1886 Lippincott imprint is a late reissue of the 1832 New York edition by W.E. Dean, published to meet the surging demand for standardized legal texts during America's post-Reconstruction industrial expansion.

This set has a distinct Southern and corporate legal provenance, passing between two notable Virginia-trained attorneys. The early owner, William Henry Landes (1858-1931), was a Virginia lawyer who served a decade as Mayor of Staunton and later represented Augusta County in the State Senate. The subsequent owner, Gordon Mountjoy Buck (1875-1970), graduated from the University of Virginia School of Law before establishing a prominent corporate practice in New York City, where he achieved national recognition handling major railway litigation for the Southern Pacific Railroad.

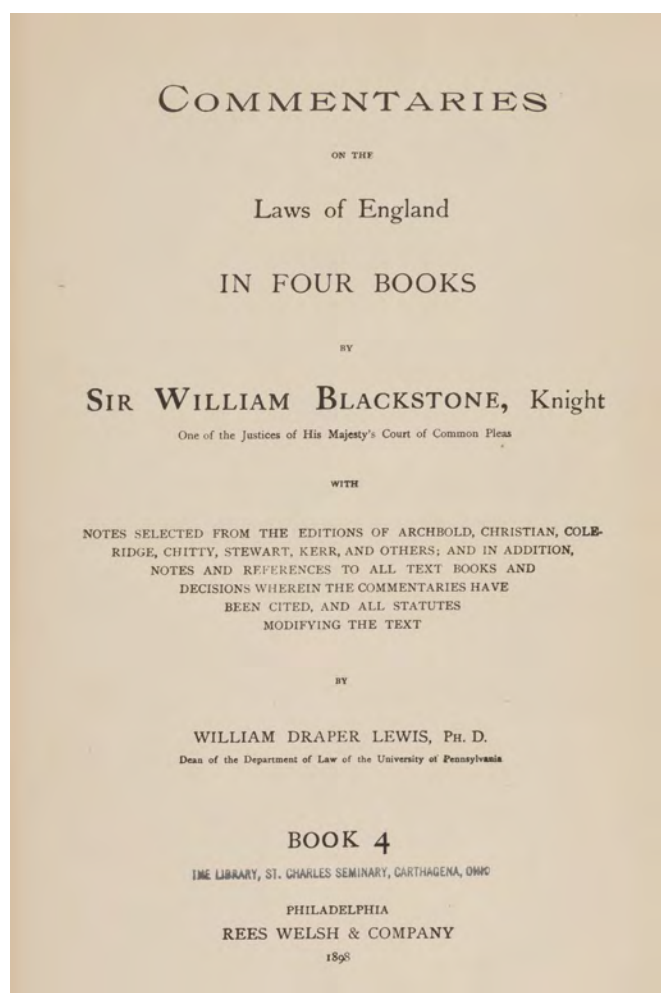
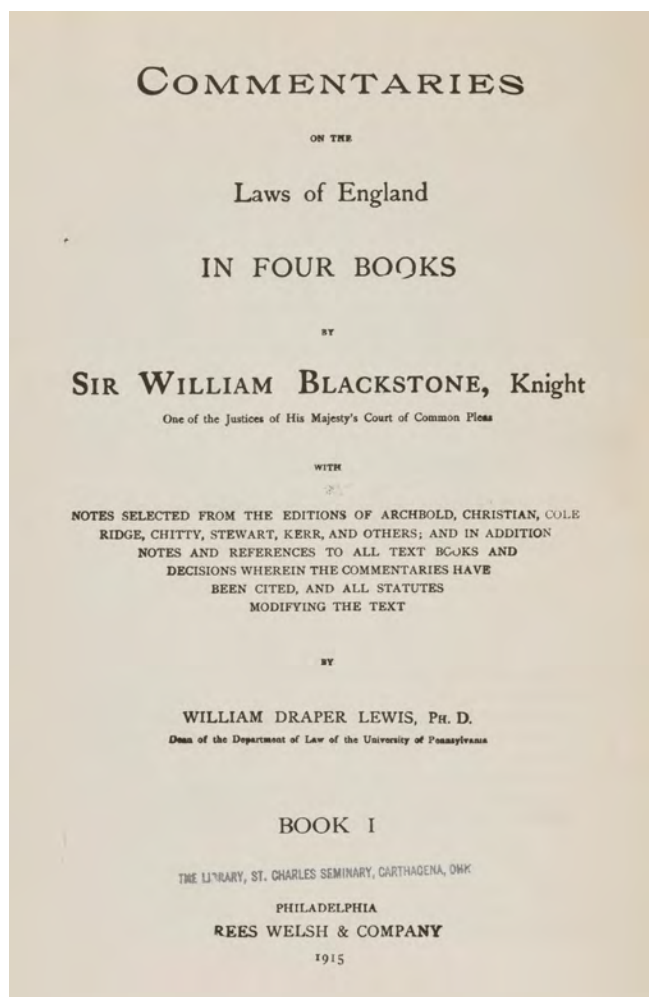

* An important scholarly edition of Blackstone's *Commentaries* containing the text of the 1778 Oxford edition (the last edited by Blackstone himself), omitting the appendices to Books 3 and 4. Lewis's edition is historically significant for modernizing Blackstone through the lens of late 19th-century legal scholarship. The editor incorporates findings from legal historians like Maine, Pollock, Maitland, and Vinogradoff, alongside a comprehensive tracking of American and English statutory updates and judicial citations. An essential resource for tracing the evolution of common law into the 20th century.

* Shaw and Tomlinson appeared to have murdered in fits of rage sparked by disputes over money. In both cases witnesses were called to prove insanity. Smith, who may have been suffering from post-partum depression, threw her twelve-day-old baby into a canal. Nobody proposed an insanity defense for her.

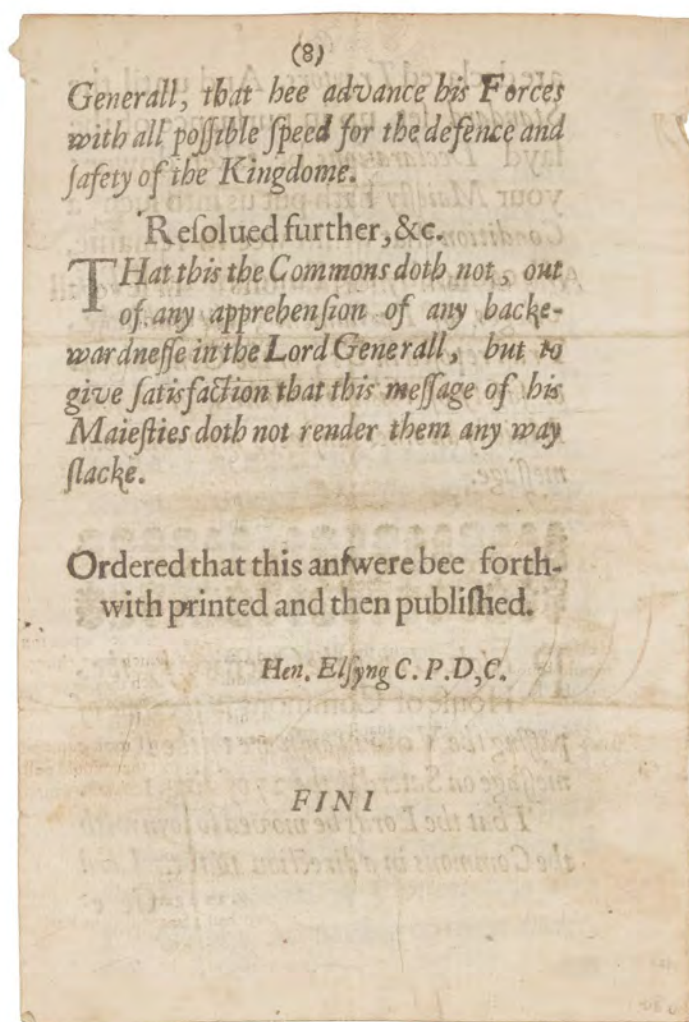

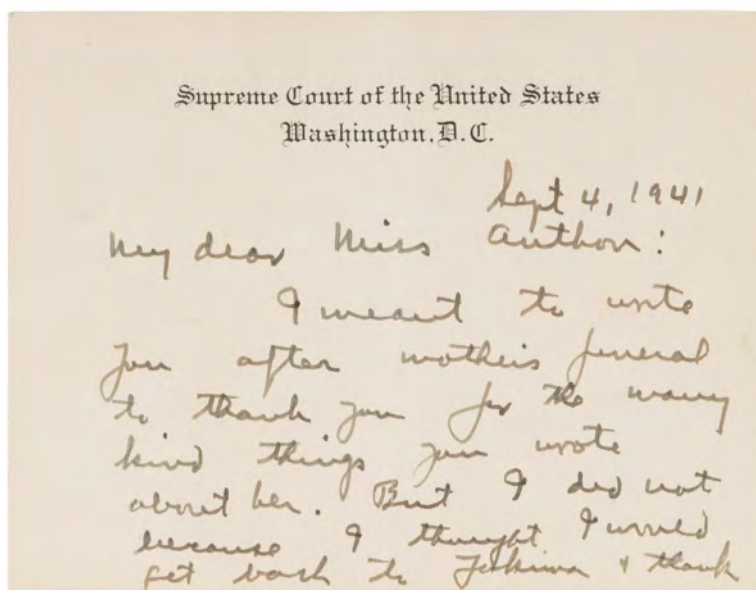
* A highly significant, introductory English Civil War tract published in London during the opening days of the hostilities. This scarce pamphlet records the final, frantic attempt at high-stakes diplomacy between King Charles I and the Long Parliament immediately following the total breakdown of their political relationship. On August 22, 1642, King Charles I raised the Royal Standard at Nottingham Castle—an aggressive, ceremonial act traditionally recognized by historians as the formal declaration and commencement of the First English Civil War. Just three days later, on August 25, Charles dispatched this "gracious and last message" to Westminster in a calculated public relations bid to frame the Crown as an earnest seeker of peace and stave off immediate military reprisal from Parliamentary forces.

The olive branch was hand-delivered by a high-profile Royalist delegation including the Earl of Dorset, the Earl of Southampton, Chancellor of the Exchequer Sir John Culpeper, and Sir William Uvedale. Parliament fiercely debated the King's overture and ratified this unyielding response on August 29, 1642. They explicitly refused to enter into treaties or negotiations until the King lowered his war standard and rescinded his proclamations denouncing members of Parliament as traitors. This tract represents a pivotal psychological and political turning point where both factions definitively committed to military conflict over political reconciliation.

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Justice William O. Douglas: A Rare 1941 Pacific Northwest Holograph Letter Mourning His Mother on Supreme Court Stationery

* An exceptional, deeply personal holograph letter from Associate Justice William O. Douglas to legendary Pacific Northwest journalist S.I. "Soester" Anthon, news editor of the Yakima Daily Republic.

Written two months after the death of his mother, Julia Bickford Fiske Douglas (who passed away on July 6, 1941), this letter reveals Douglas's profound grief and deep-seated ties to his hometown. Utilizing official Supreme Court stationery while traveling through the West before the start of the judicial term, Douglas apologizes for his delayed gratitude, explaining that he had fully intended to thank her in person but would not be able to return to the Yakima Valley "this season."

He goes on to deliver an extraordinary, emotional tribute to Anthon's journalistic coverage of his mother's passing: "No news reporting has ever touched me so deeply. You did it all so beautifully. As pieces of literature they were works of art."

Letters from sitting Supreme Court Justices displaying this level of raw vulnerability and personal connection to their roots are distinctly rare. Postmarked from La Grande, Oregon, this item beautifully captures Douglas in his preferred element, the Pacific Northwest, maintaining a tender bridge between his monumental legal career in Washington, D.C., and the local community that raised him.

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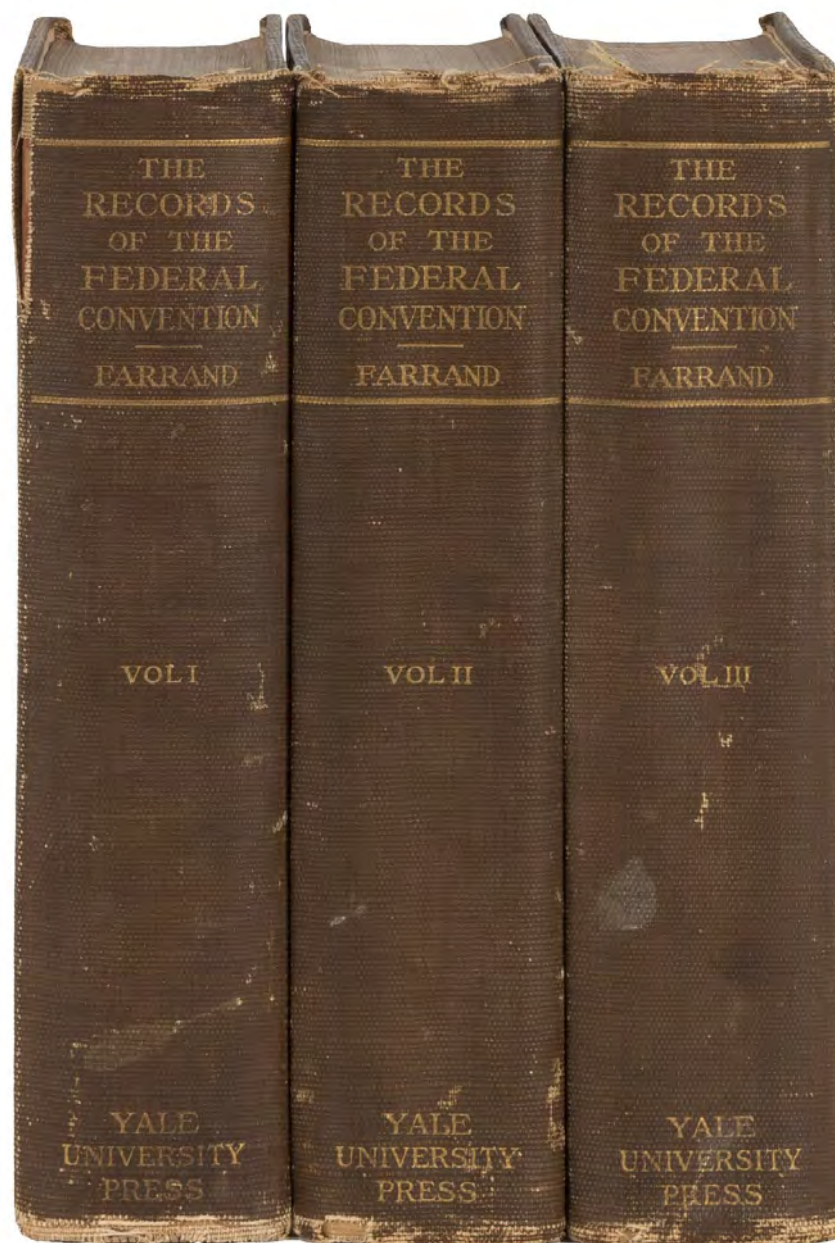

* A compelling visual document capturing one of the defining legal and cultural flashpoints of 20th-century America. Pitting modern scientific thought against religious fundamentalism, the 1925 trial of John T. Scopes became a true multimedia sensation-the first in U.S. history to be broadcast live on national radio. This photograph captures defense attorney Clarence Darrow in his element, holding the courtroom captive. The pasted newspaper caption on the verso beautifully preserves the sweltering, high-stakes atmosphere of the Dayton courthouse, noting that "press and radio hang on the words of the shirt-sleeved Darrow as he tells the sweltering courtroom why teacher Scopes should go free." While the court ultimately ruled against the defense, Darrow's masterful performance achieved its true objective, successfully putting fundamentalism on trial before a global audience. An evocative piece of American legal history.

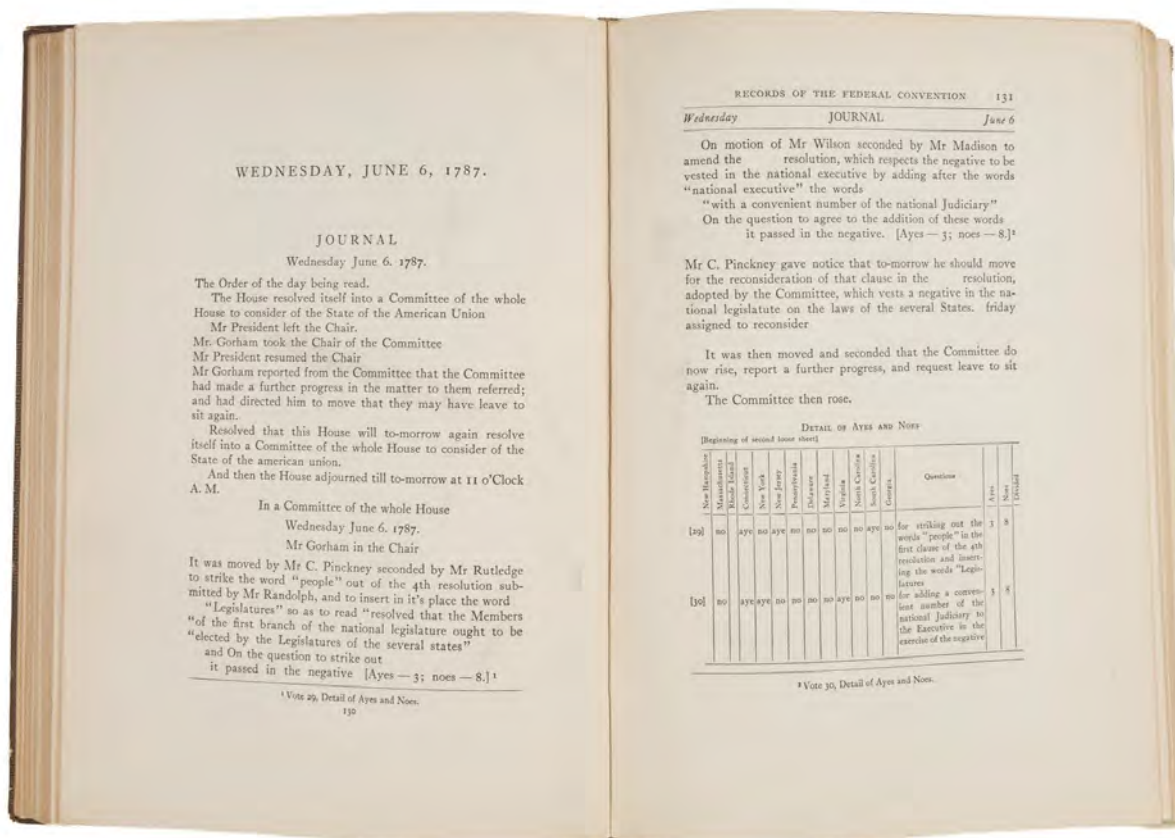

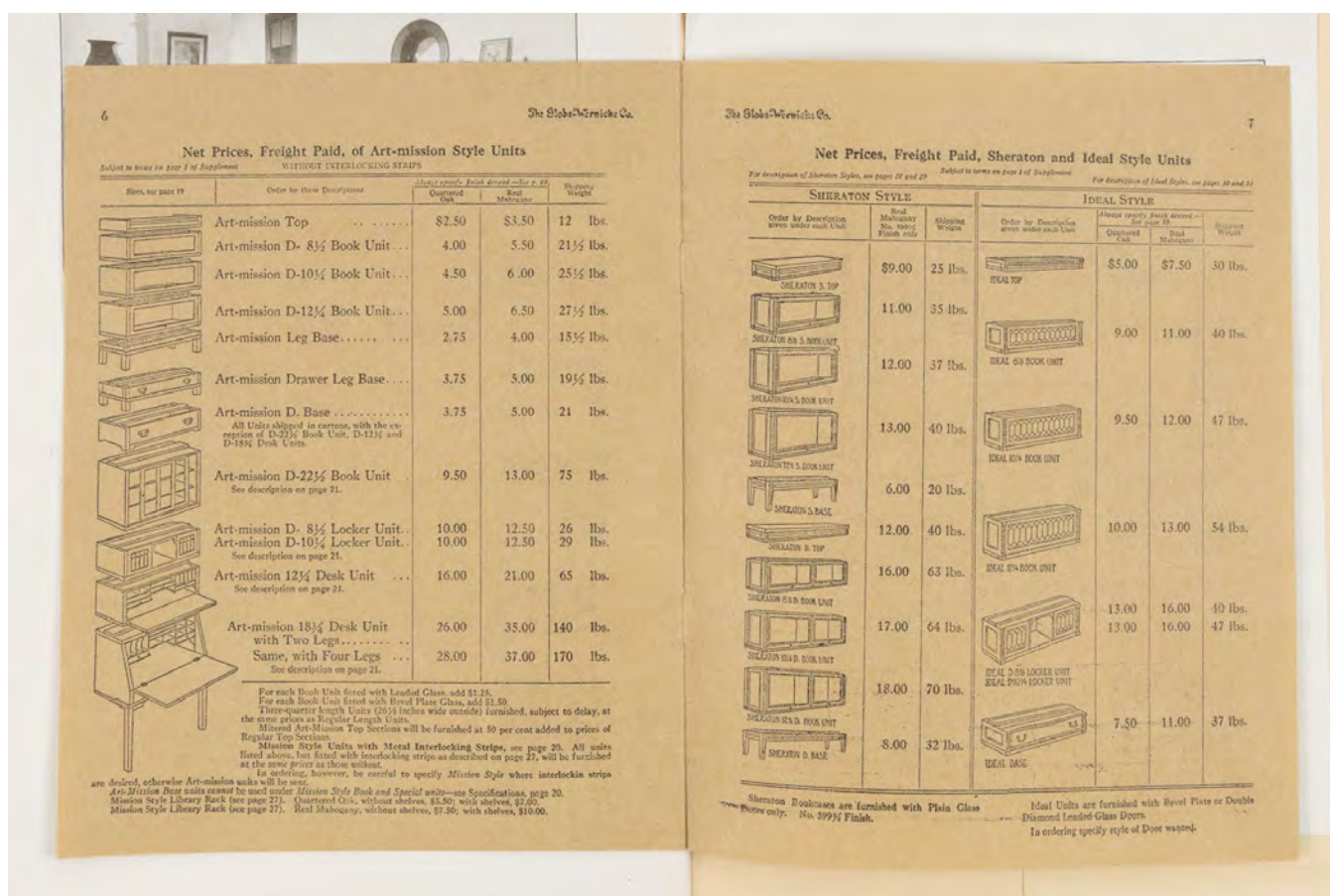
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* Commonly referred to as "Farrand's Records," this definitive three-volume compilation stands as the absolute cornerstone of American constitutional history. Because the original sessions of the 1787 Philadelphia Convention were held in complete secrecy, subsequent decades saw a confusing array of incomplete accounts and fragments emerge in print. Farrand successfully synthesized the official, sparse government journals with the private notes, letters, and draft plans kept by the delegates themselves.

Over half of the work presents the peerless, day-by-day floor notes recorded by James Madison, contextualized alongside documents from other major participants. This particular set was originally retailed by T.H. Flood & Co., a prominent turn-of-the-century Chicago legal publisher and bookseller, grounding this copy in the early 20th-century American legal trade. As a contemporary review in the *Harvard Law Review* observed shortly after publication, the set provides a "convenient and painstaking view of the various contemporaneous accounts... indispensable to anyone who is searching at first hand for any fact as to the transactions of the Federal Convention" (Vol. 25, pp. 198-199). It remains the premier resource for lawyers, historians, and jurists seeking to interpret the spirit and original meaning of the United States Constitution.

* An essential commercial document capturing the golden age of American office design and its profound impact on the legal profession. Formed by an 1899 merger, the Globe-Wernicke Company achieved historic market dominance largely due to the rapid, near-universal adoption of its patented "Elastic Bookcase" configurations by early 20th-century law firms. This reliance permanently cemented the style's enduring moniker, the "barrister bookcase." Legal practitioners required modular, interlocking units that could linearly scale alongside growing collections of heavy, expensive case reporters, while the patented "lift-and-slide" glass doors offered critical protection against the destructive coal soot and dust common to period law offices. This trade catalogue showcases these versatile systems at the apex of their professional utility, complete with the exceptionally rare, transient price inserts that infrequently survive.

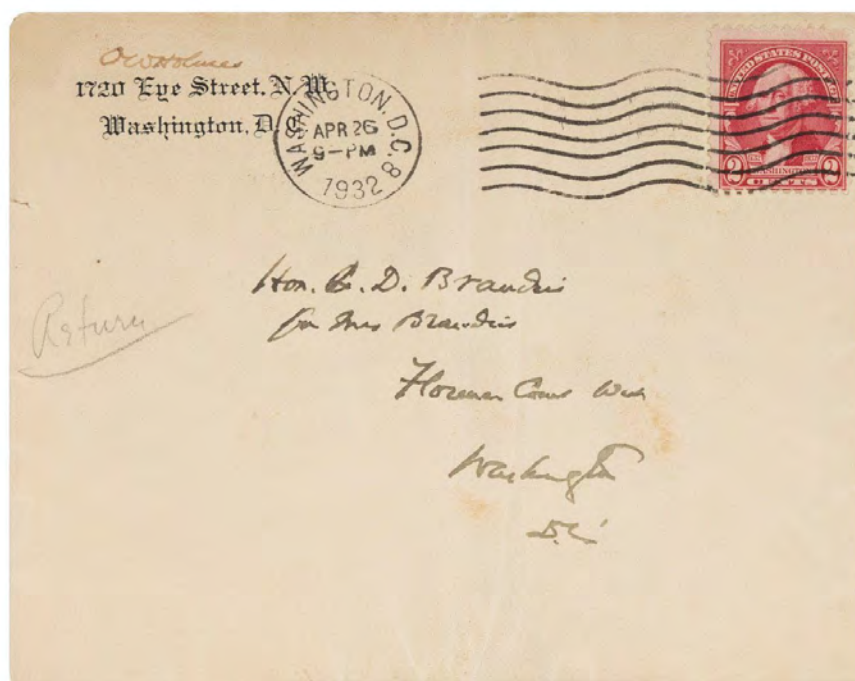
* A stately holiday greeting sent during Holmes's first year of retirement from the Supreme Court. Holmes had stepped down in January 1932 at the age of ninety, concluding three decades on the nation's highest bench as the revered "Great Dissenter." The card offers an evocative visual artifact from the twilight of his life: sent from Washington just months after laying down his judicial pen, and picturing the Capitol where he had shaped modern American constitutional jurisprudence

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for thirty terms.

A poignant, deeply reflective letter written three months after Holmes's retirement from the Supreme Court, capturing a rare personal moment of intimacy between the Holmes and Brandeis households. Writing to thank Alice Goldmark Brandeis for a gift of spring flowers, the 91-year-old jurist muses on a recent afternoon drive into Virginia, deploying a brilliant artistic and historical metaphor for his retirement:

"My dear Mrs Brandeis - Thank you greatly for the most beautiful little white flowers. Yesterday we tried to find out what they were, in books, but are slow. They are an old acquaintance from New England. Today I have been at Fairfax Court House to renew my youth. And my old notion occurred to me of working in a canvas as Lord Fairfax over the fading land. Sincerely yours, O W Holmes."

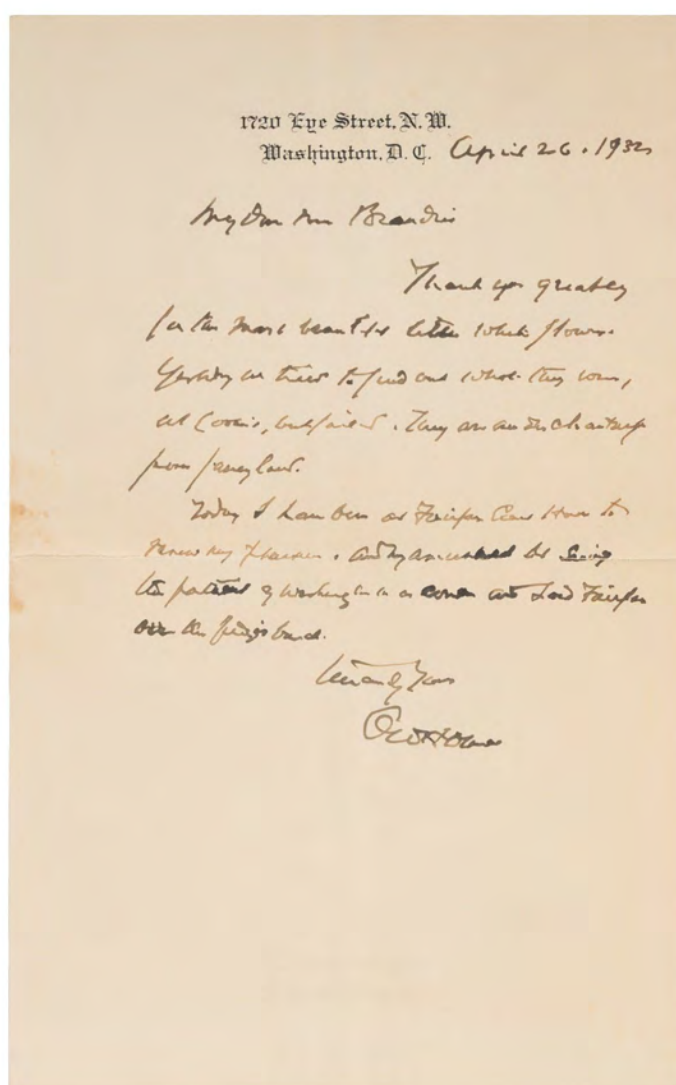
In January 1932, Holmes retired from the Supreme Court after decades of monumental jurisprudence alongside his close

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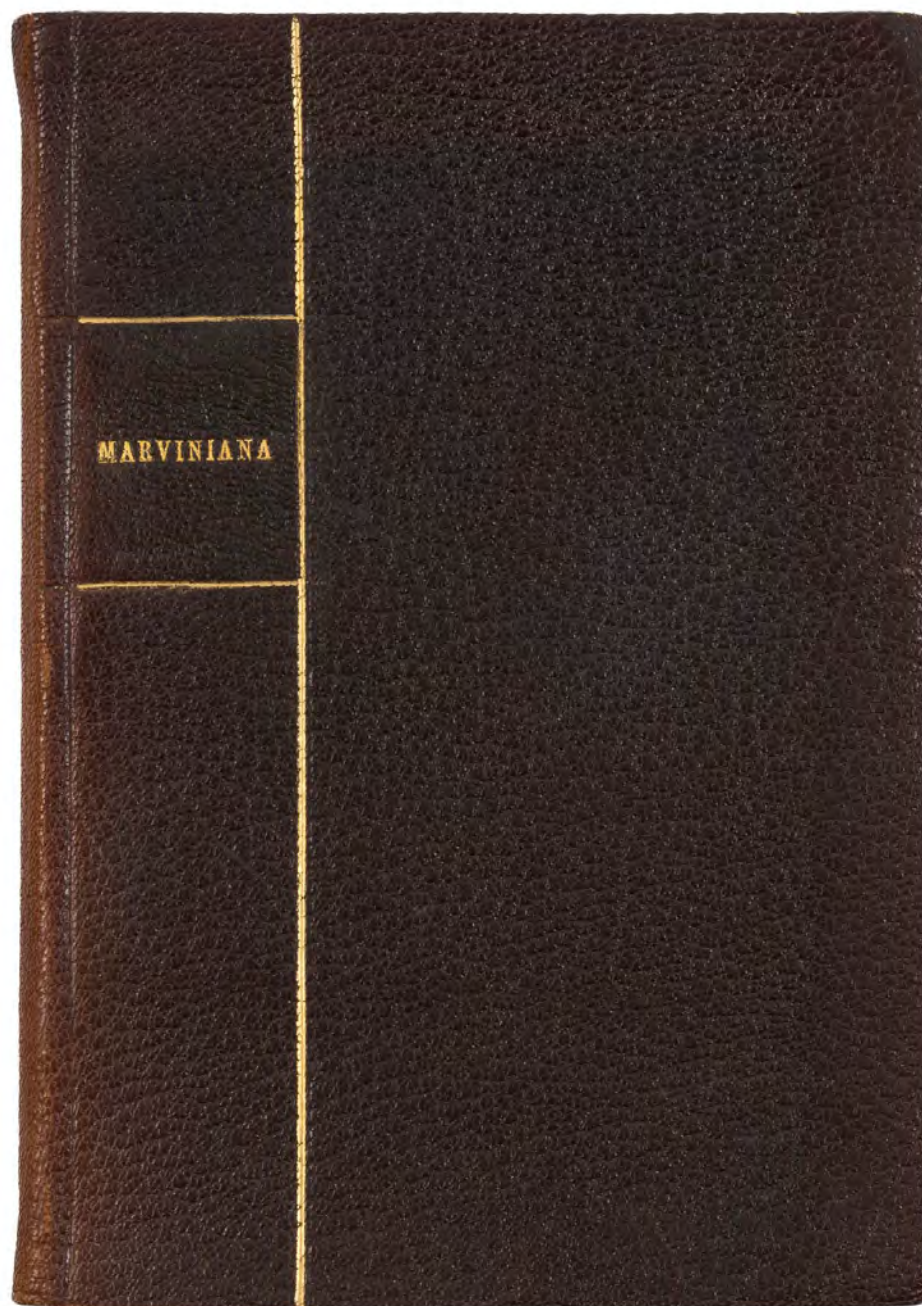
friend and ideological ally, Louis D. Brandeis. This letter captures Holmes adapting to his post-bench life through his daily routine of taking long automobile drives through Northern Virginia to "renew his youth."

His reference to Thomas, 6th Lord Fairfax-the grand colonial proprietor who lived out his final years in quiet, isolated retreat during the chaos of the American Revolution-serves as an elegant, melancholic metaphor for his own transition from a titanic public figure to a passive observer. Rather than viewing himself in a medical "coma," Holmes dynamically visualizes himself being painted into a historic "canvas," watching over a "fading land."

The envelope adds significant contextual depth, showing it was sent directly to Justice Brandeis's active chambers or apartment at the historic Florence Court West complex, explicitly earmarked for his wife.

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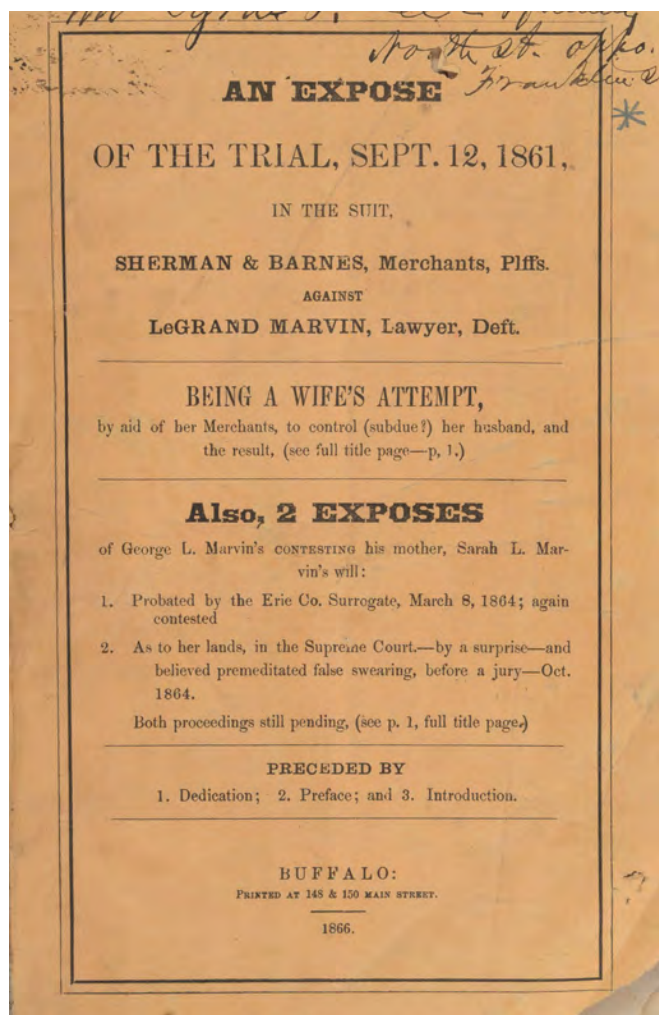

Written by the prominent and increasingly eccentric Buffalo attorney LeGrand Marvin, this text aggressively details the fracturing of his law partnership with his brother, George L. Marvin, following a bitter dispute over the estate of their late mother, Sarah.

The resulting legal warfare lasted for more than twenty-two years, outliving George and concluding in LeGrand's favor only a year before his own death. This copy features a distinctive contemporary bespoke binding stamped "Marviniana," suggesting it was compiled and bound for an contemporary attorney or legal observer following this highly publicized local scandal.

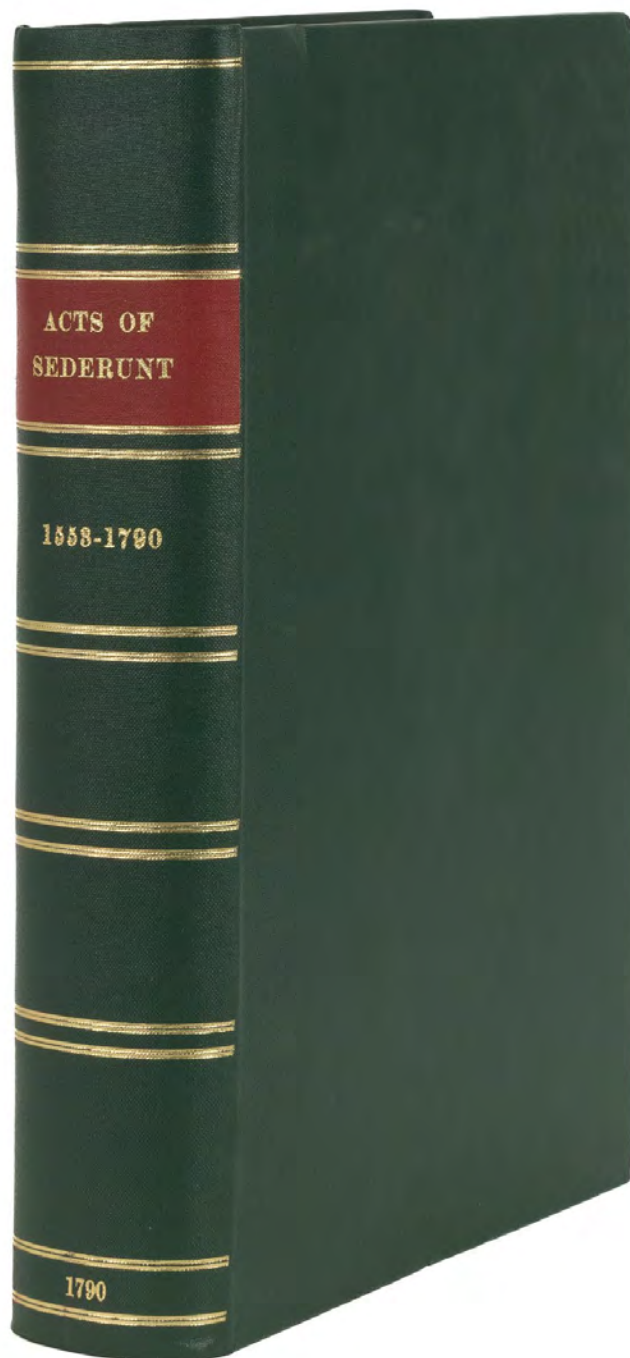
* First edition. A foundational guide on how property, money, and gifts (called "legacies") were legally given to people through wills in 19th-century England. During the 1800s, British inheritance law was incredibly strict and complicated. Preston wrote this "practical treatise" (which just means a thorough, step-by-step textbook) to help lawyers and judges understand types of legacies, their conditions and various debts and reductions.

In *Commentaries on American Law*, James Kent says "the law of legacies has been well digested by Mr. Roper, but with more force, precision and accuracy by Mr. Preston." A reprint edition, star-paged to the London edition, was published in New York in 1827.

Commissioned under James I and updated for Charles I, *Mare Clausum* ("The Closed Sea") serves as the fundamental legal justification for British dominion over the surrounding seas. Where Grotius relied on broad philosophical deductions, Selden anchored his defense of private maritime ownership in exhaustive historical precedent, positive law, ancient statutes, and multilingual medieval codes. The work became the cornerstone of 17th-century English maritime policy and established Selden as a preeminent legal mind of early modern Europe.

This copy features a compelling pair of structural printed fragments used as binder's waste, providing a material case study of a mid-1630s London workshop recycling international statecraft and domestic playhouse proofs simultaneously:

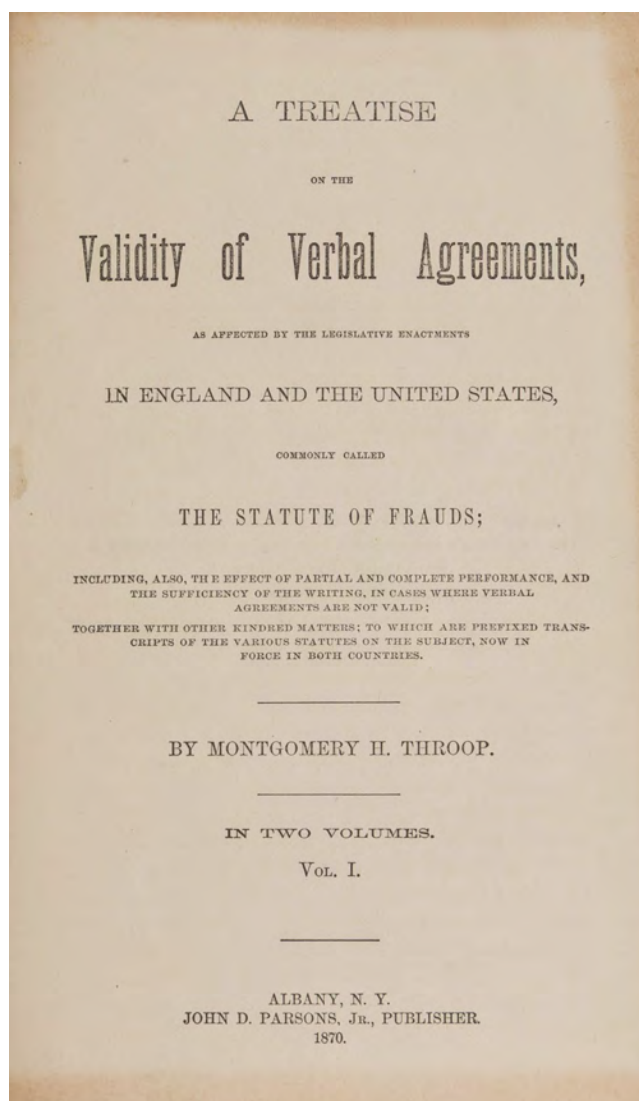

* This is the only edition of Montgomery H. Throop's ambitious and comprehensive work examining the Statute of Frauds. First enacted in England in 1677, the Statute of Frauds requires certain contracts—such as land transfers, debt guarantees, and long-term agreements—to be memorialized in writing and signed to be legally enforceable. Throop's treatise provides an exhaustive, comparative analysis of how courts across various American jurisdictions and England interpreted, enforced, or carved out exceptions to oral (verbal) agreements. Though intended as the first volume of a larger study, Volume I was the only volume ever published, making it complete as issued.

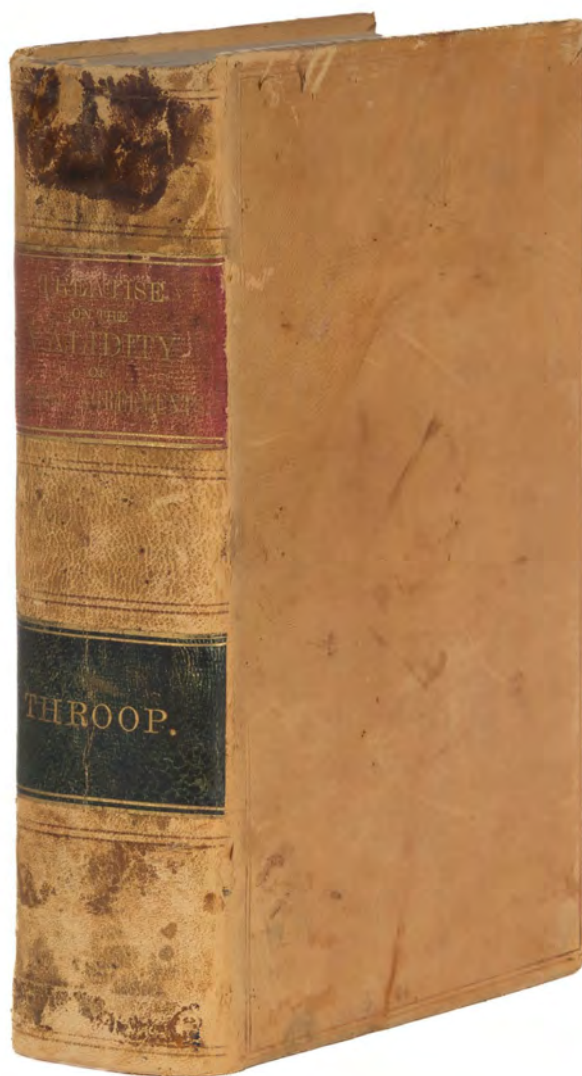
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Throop was one of the late 19th century's most influential American legal scholars and codifiers. Best known for serving as Chairman of the New York State Commission to Revise the Statutes, he spearheaded the overhaul of the New York Code of Civil Procedure (often referred to as the "Throop Code"). His deep technical understanding of statutory mechanics and common law precedent is on full display in this volume.

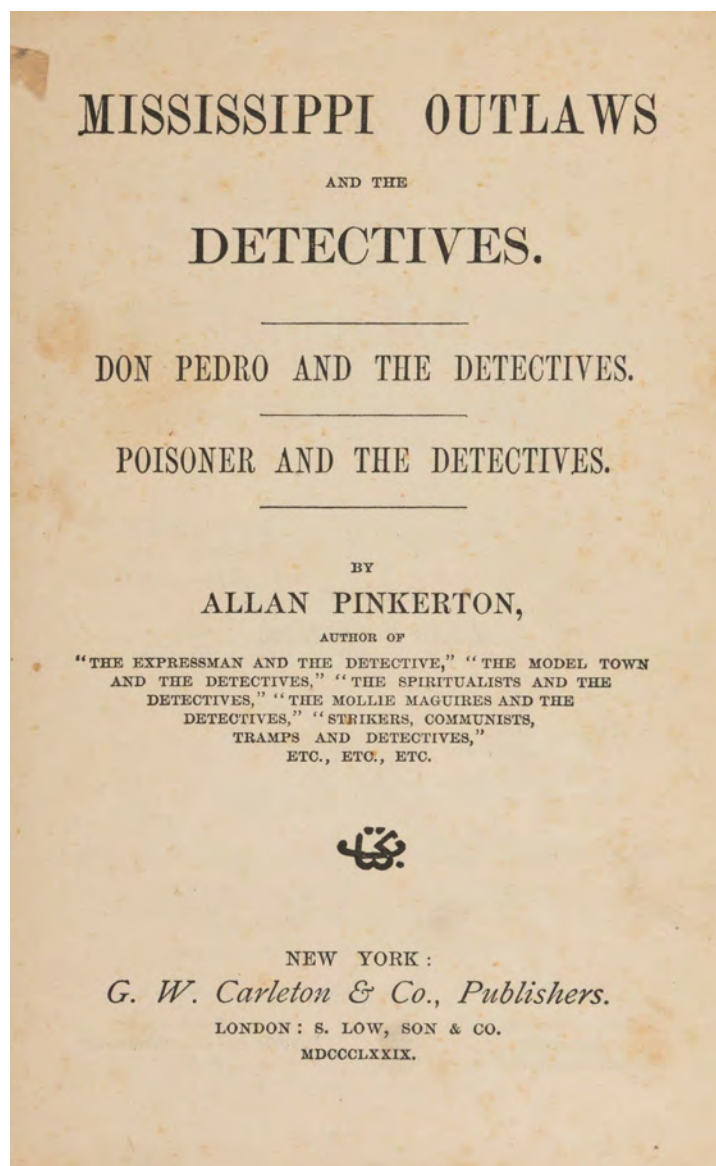

Originally published by Giles Jacob in 1729, this work revolutionized legal lexicography by blending a standard dictionary with a substantive legal abridgment to create the first accessible legal encyclopedia. For the generation of American Founders framing a new legal infrastructure, Tomlins' modernized text was indispensable. He executed a massive structural overhaul that replaced Jacob's obsolete feudal terminology with terms suited for the rapidly growing transatlantic commercial world. Thomas Jefferson famously owned Tomlins' text, using it to consult on constitutional matters and recommending it on his law reading syllabi.

Significantly for American collectors, this specific 1809 London edition served as the direct textual blueprint for transatlantic legal history: a Philadelphia reprint of this exact text in 1811 became the very first legal dictionary printed on American soil. This copy also carries a striking visual artifact of early usage; a distinct spine crease on Volume 2 reveals it was historically held wide open at the entry for "Pardons," an executive prerogative fiercely debated by early American jurists adapting English common law to the new republic.

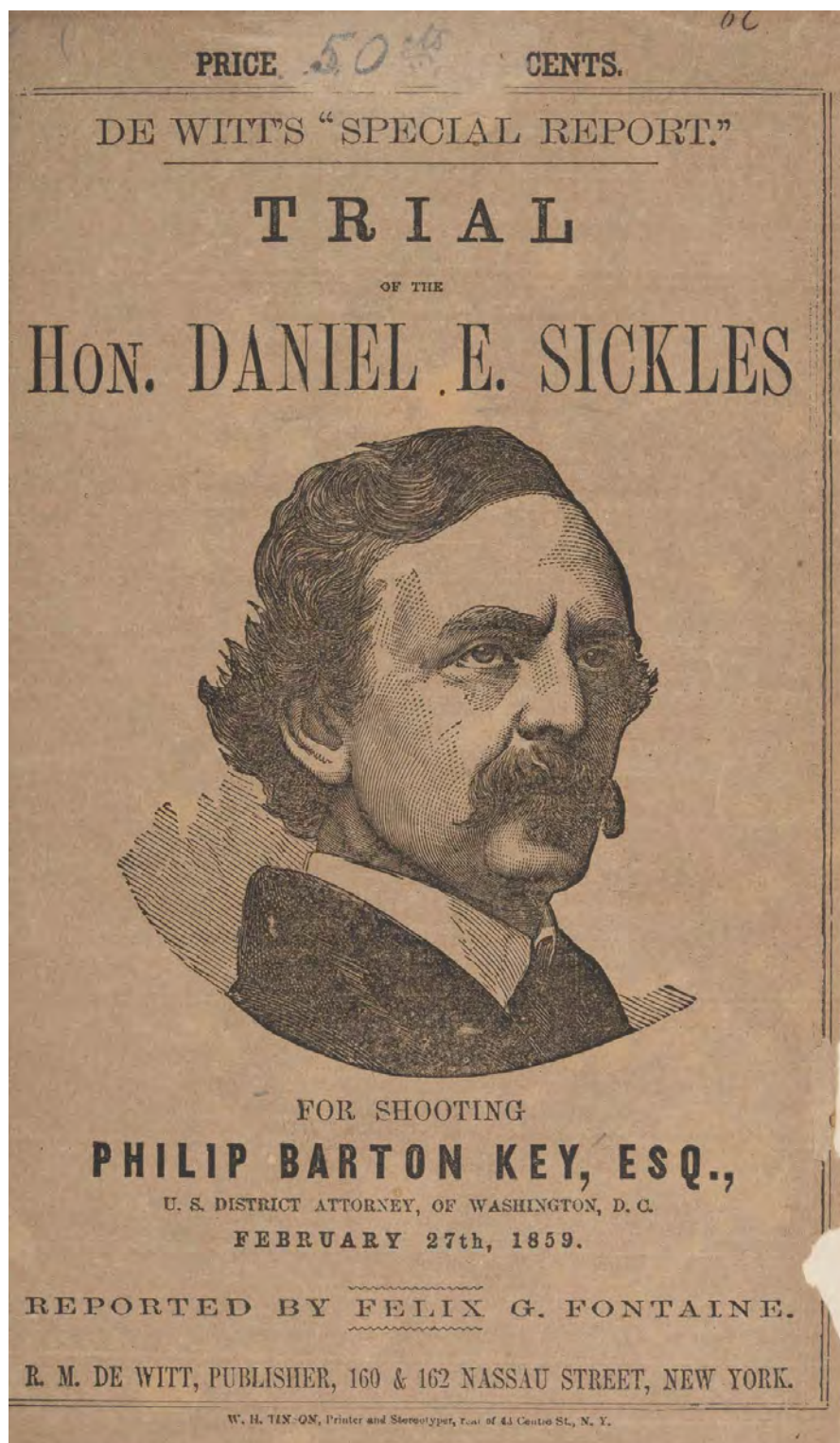

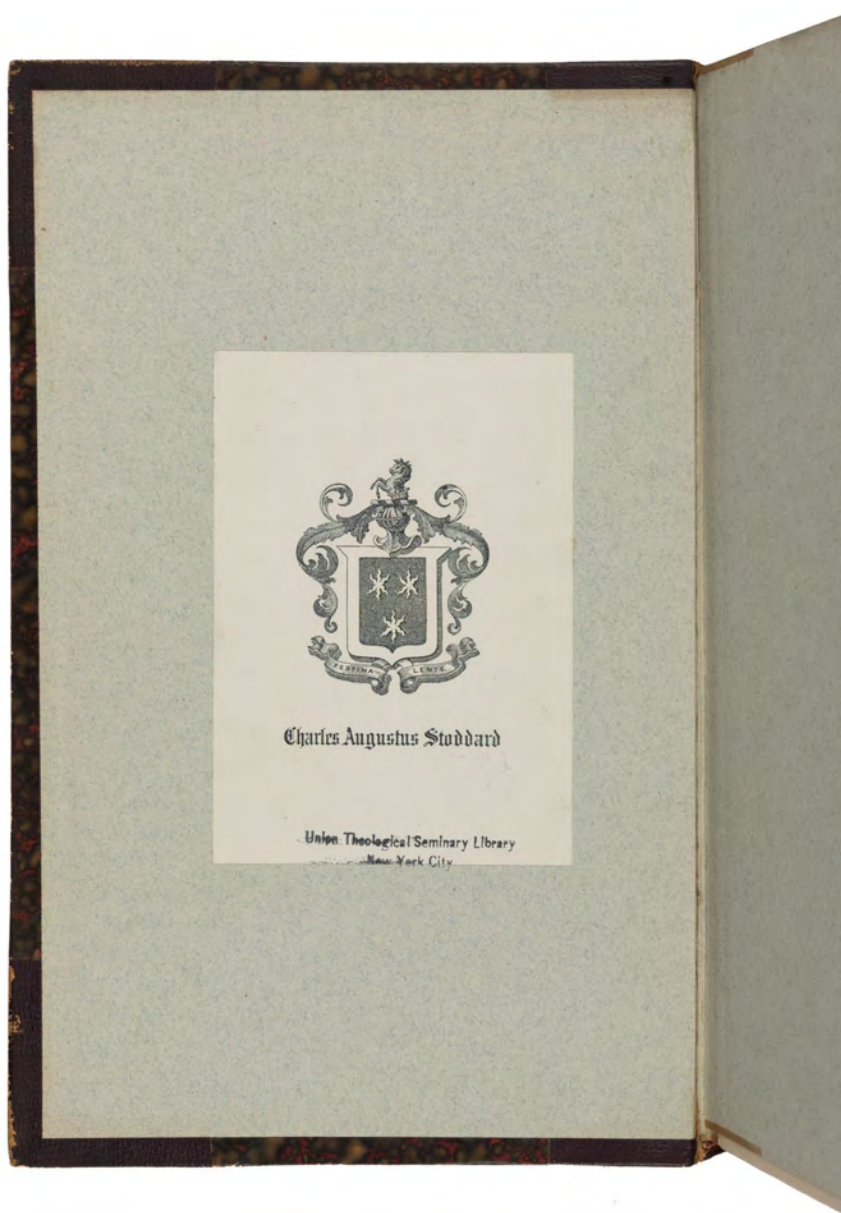

The Sickles trial was the first in which a defendant used a temporary insanity plea, a tactic that resulted in an acquittal. Mrs. Burch defends herself against Mr. Burch, a well known Chicago banker, who sued her for divorce on the grounds of adultery. *HLC* II:1029. *NYU* 963. The Beardsley divorce trial unearthed adultery on the part of both husband and wife in 1860 Brooklyn. Hicks was a triple murderer who chopped up the captain and two crew members in lower New York Bay. His execution in New York Harbor was *cause celebre*.

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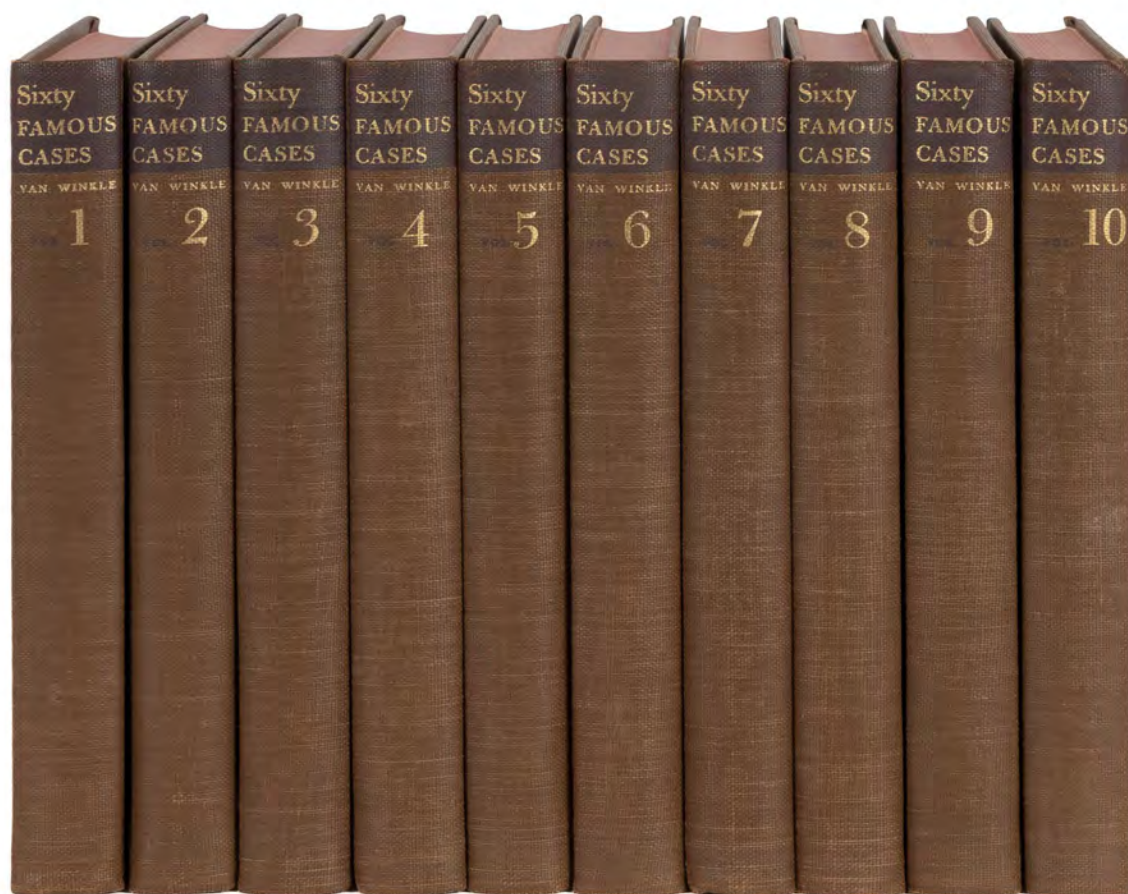
Dumollard was a notorious French serial killer who targeted young servant girls between 1855 and 1861 with his accomplice wife, Marie-Anne Martinet. She would help steal the victim's clothing and meager belongings and conceal Dumollard's crimes by washing out the bloodstains and selling the stolen clothes at local markets. He is often considered one of the very first documented serial killers in modern history, operating three decades before *Jack the Ripper*. At the height of the Civil War, the powerful editor of the *Albany Evening Journal*, Thurlow Weed, accused New York City Mayor George Opdyke of using his office to reap illicit profits from government military contracts. Hughes shot a seventeen year old girl he had seduced while intoxicated. "At his execution, he spoke for fifteen minutes until the sheriff reminded him 'Time is going.' Then he dropped" (*McDade*).

This copy was owned by Charles Augustus Stoddard [1833-1920] a notable Presbyterian clergyman, editor, writer and bibliophile with an extensive collection housed in the Columbia University Library.

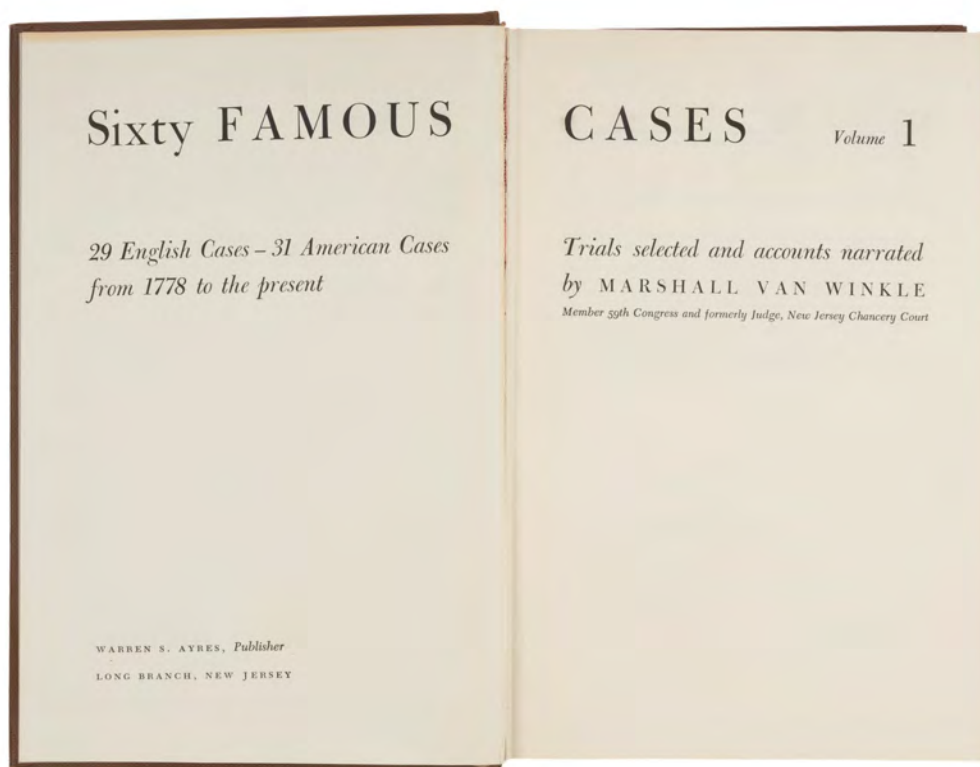
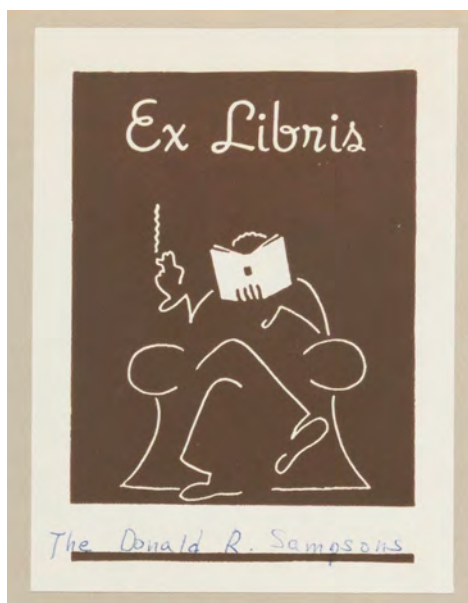

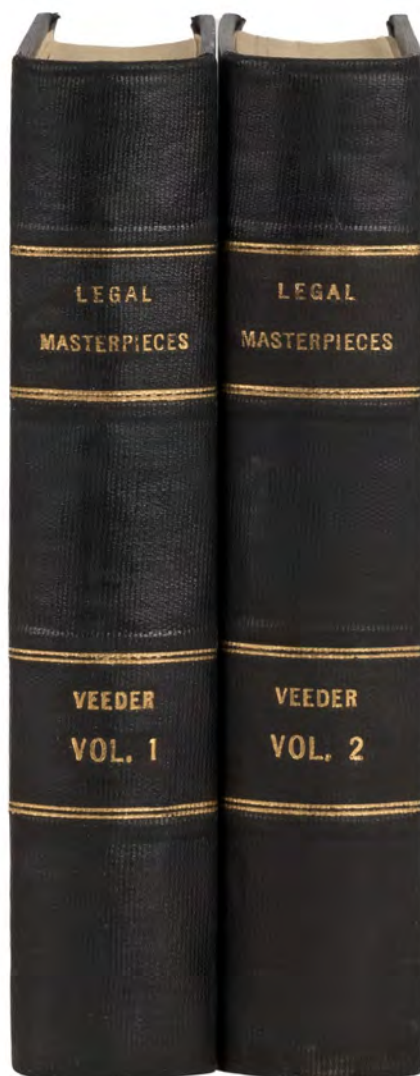

Sampson, who served in the Military Police Corps before establishing his practice, was later distinguished as a Fellow of the American College of Trust and Estate Counsel, highlighting the set's enduring utility within an active, elite 20th-century legal library.

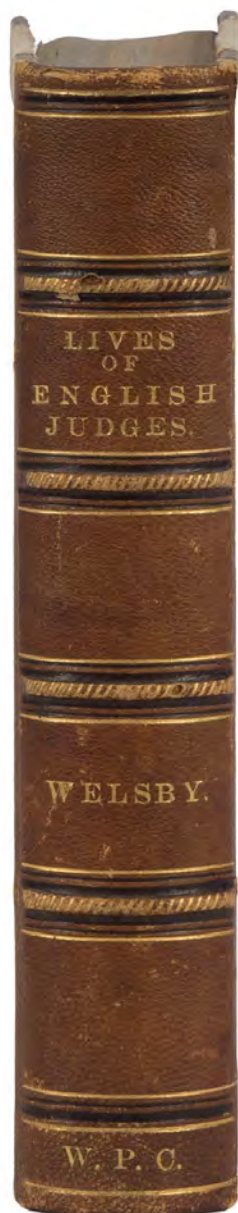

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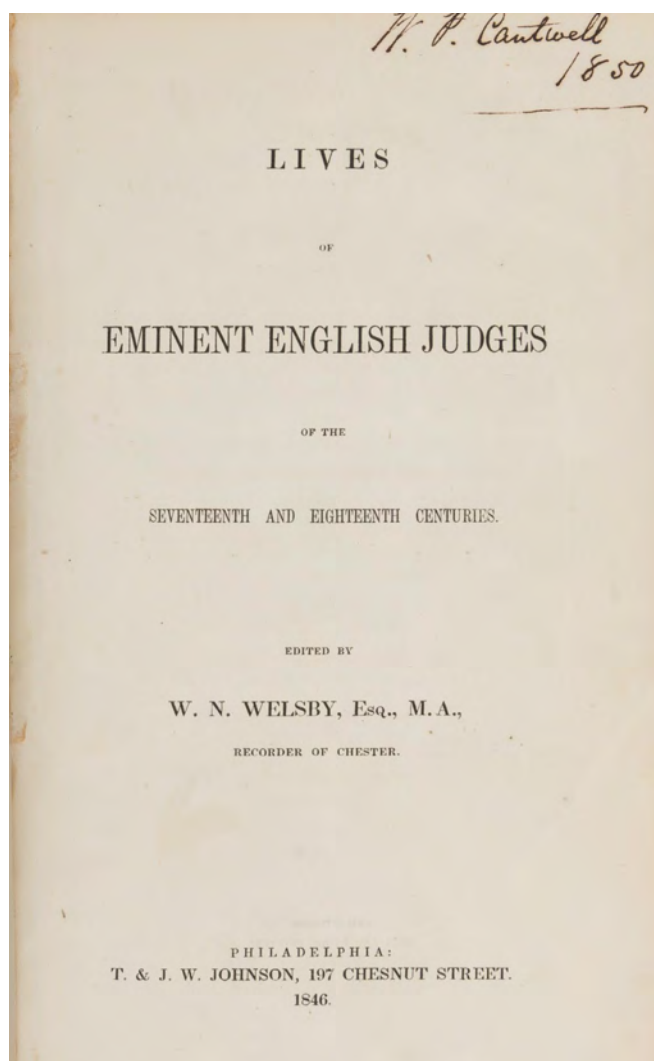

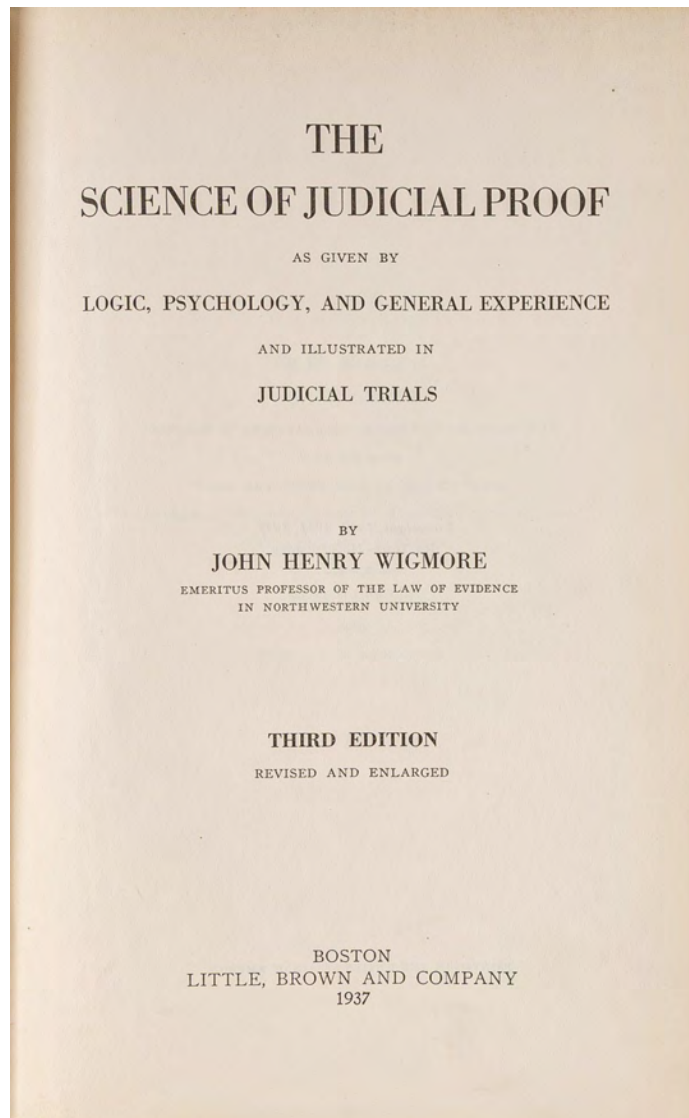

* Third edition, revised and enlarged. Wigmore's magnum opus represents the pinnacle of his intellectual inquiry into the nature of proof. While Wigmore is most famous for his multi-volume Treatise on Evidence, he considered this work-The Science of Judicial Proof-to be his most significant contribution to the field.

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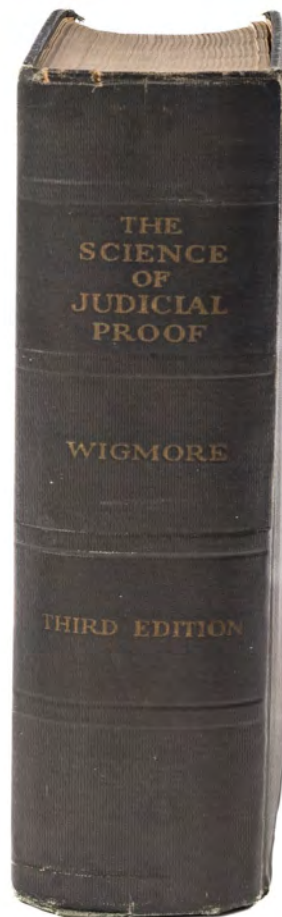
It is considered a pioneering work in the field of evidence analysis and a key contribution by one of the most influential legal scholars of his time.

The primary significance of the book is its focus on the process of judicial proof (how evidence is evaluated to reach a conclusion) rather than just the rules of admissibility (whether evidence can be presented in court). Wigmore argued that while rules of admissibility were important, the ultimate goal of a trial was rational persuasion of the decision-maker (judge or jury), an area he felt was often neglected in legal education.

Wigmore was an early and strong advocate for applying principles from other fields to the law of evidence, including logic, psychology, and general experience. He dedicated the first edition (titled *The Principles of Judicial Proof*) to Hans Gross, "the father of scientific crime detection," demonstrating his interest in integrating scientific methods into legal reasoning and investigation.

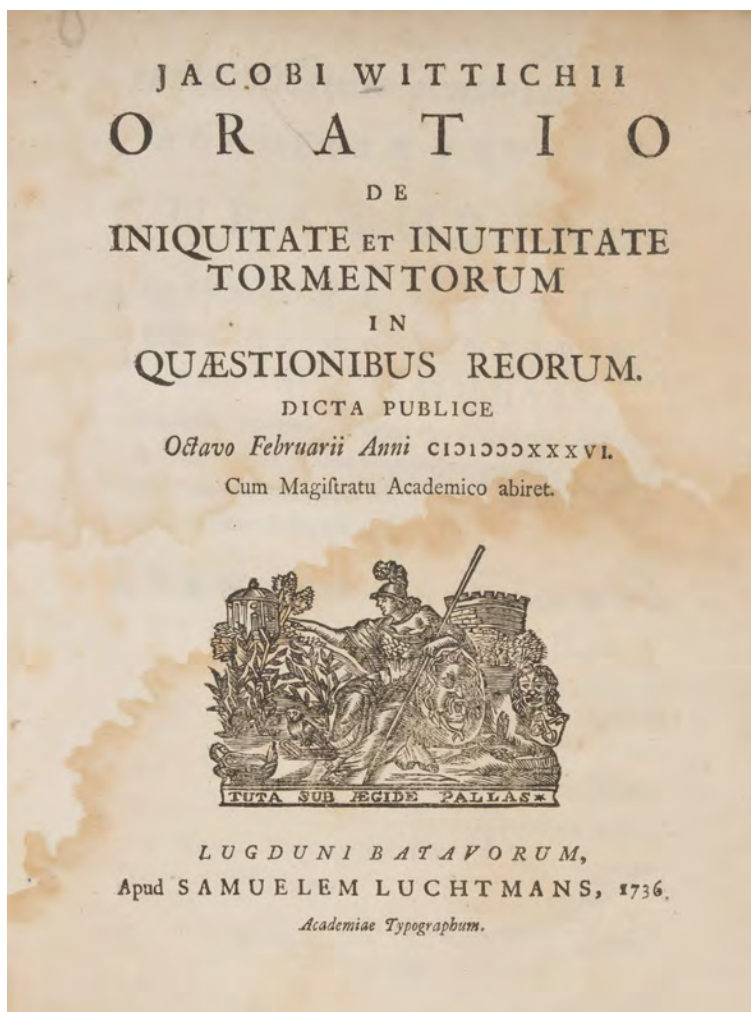
The book introduced the influential "chart method," a graphical system for diagramming the logical structure of evidence and arguments in a case. This method allowed for a visual representation of how different items of evidence connected to the main propositions of a case, helping lawyers analyze complex fact patterns systematically. This method is considered a precursor to modern "belief networks" and continues to be studied and developed by contemporary evidence scholars.

This book remains a foundational text for anyone interested in the theory of evidence and fact-finding in legal contexts.

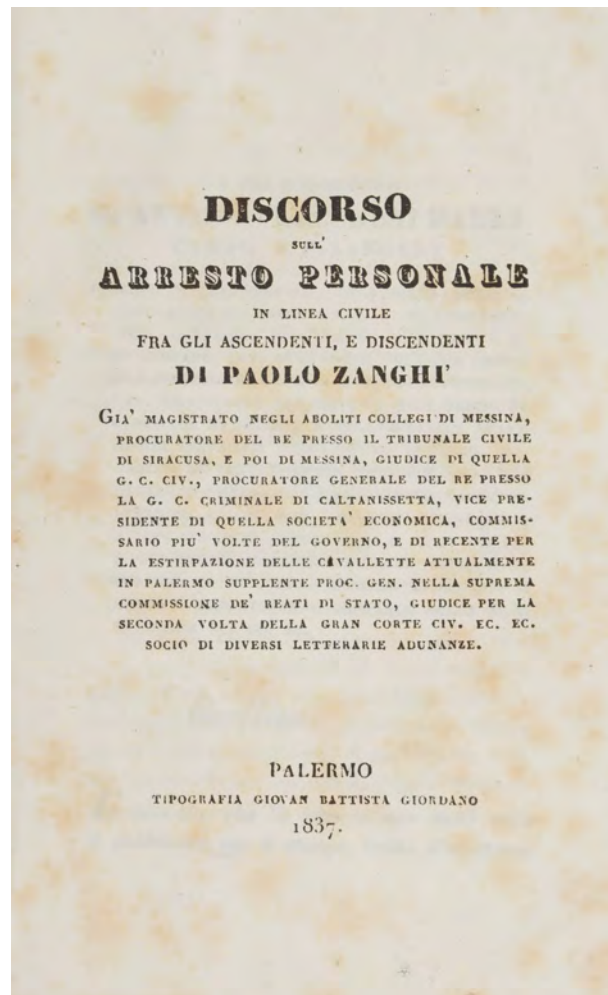

* An important, early Enlightenment legal address delivered publicly on February 8, 1736, by Dutch philosopher and professor Jacobus Wittichius upon stepping down from his university post. Written in Latin, this speech serves as a powerful foundational text against judicial torture.

Wittichius provides a methodical argument proving that physical torture is both morally wrong and functionally useless for finding the truth. This text is a vital precursor to the humanitarian legal reforms of the later 18th century. It directly anticipates the landmark arguments published decades later by famous legal reformers like Cesare Beccaria, which ultimately led European nations to abolish judicial torture.

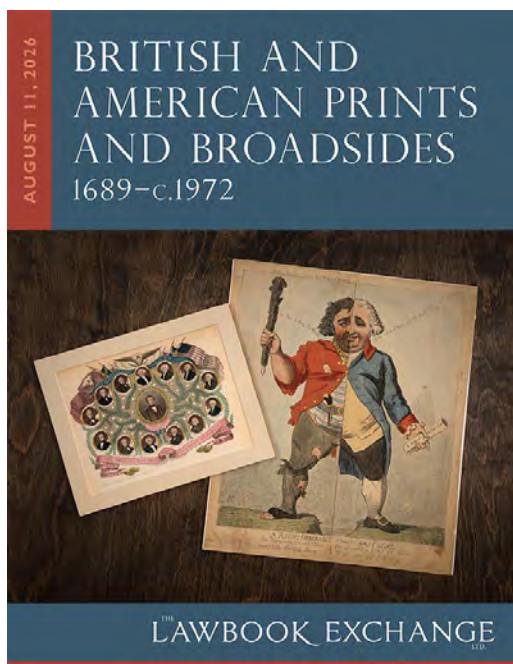
* A rare Sicilian legal tract protesting the practice of *arresto personale* (debtor's prison) within the family unit. Writing under the Bourbon restoration in the Kingdom of the Two Sicilies, notable magistrate and legal scholar Paolo Zanghi tackles the grim legal weaponization of state infrastructure by family members to imprison their own kin over unpaid civil debts.

Zanghi focuses his defense specifically on the generational axis between parents (*ascendenti*) and children (*discendenti*). He argues that arresting a family member over financial shortfalls subverts both natural morality and civil harmony. To build his case, Zanghi synthesizes classical Roman jurisprudence via the *Pandects* with the Enlightenment philosophy of Montesquieu and Samuel von Pufendorf, showcasing how regional Sicilian jurists actively participated in the pan-European intellectual movement to humanize civil codes. An important and scarce document tracing the intersection of 19th-century family law, economics and early human rights advocacy.

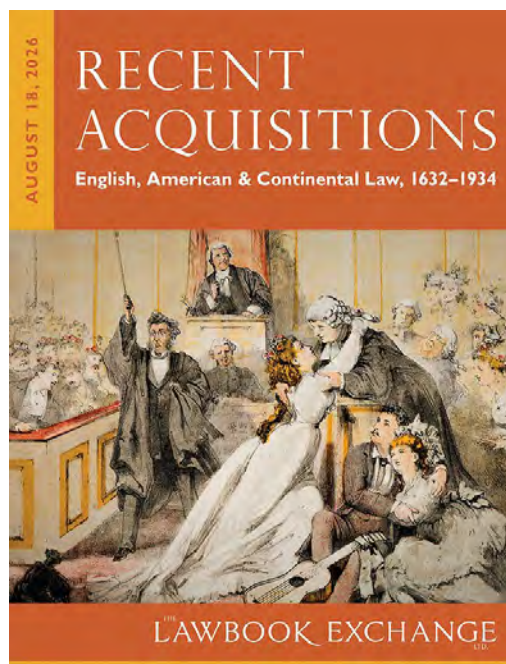
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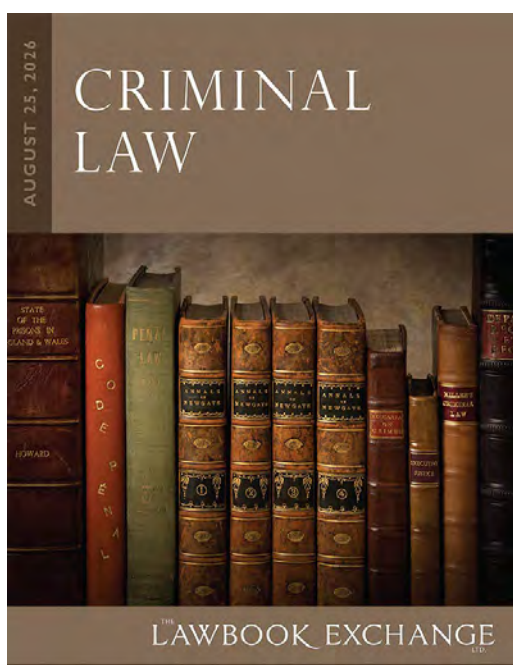
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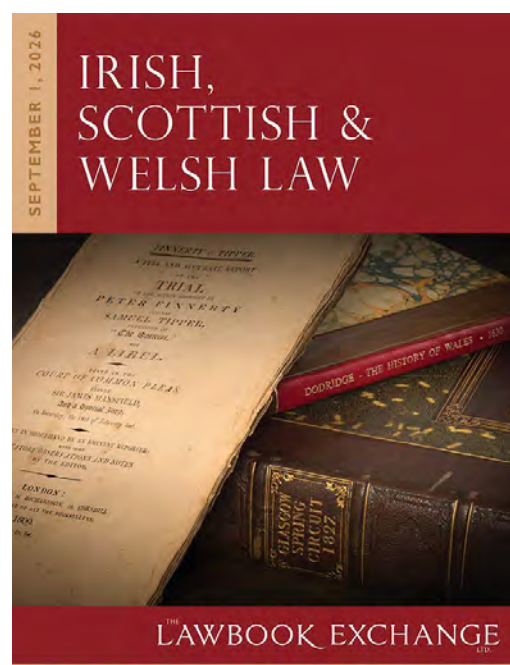
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
